In my quest, I came across David Baldacci now the New York Times BestSeller, Heath, who seemed to fit the bill perfectly... until I realized that this was actually the 2nd book for Baldacci's newest character, Will Roby, so I realized that I would start with Roby's debut story, Innocent. 3-Letter Agency Asset As the author of the summary explains, Will Roby is a highly qualified and best killer for the United States government. He works for a three-letter agency, which of course disavows any knowledge of Roby's existence if he ever got caught or captured... luckily for Will, he never missed and never missed a mission.
